Headteacher's Message:

Dear Parents/ Carers,



Disappointingly, we have had another positive Coronavirus test case in school this week. This has resulted in one KS3 class and a small number of additional children being asked to selfisolate at home. This is the first test case we have had in some time, but suggests that despite the positive effects of the last 4 weeks' lockdown that we all must continue daily to practice social distancing and undertake appropriate hand hygiene. We are sending work packs home from staff, so children can continue learning in the home environment. We are also sending home daily lessons that have been pre-recorded from class teachers to help engage our learners in the activities they have been asked to undertake in the home.

During the month of Advent we continue to help prepare the children and young people in their preparations for the Birth of Jesus. We have some exciting plans for the last week of term for the whole school community to celebrate the festive season and explore further the full meaning of Christmas. We continue to send home the weekly 'Wednesday Word', which will provide you with an opportunity to share in your child's spiritual journey through the Advent season and also support their wider literacy development.

This week we have been promoting Pope Francis' message 'The Lord is coming. May we await him with open hearts'. The first Advent theme is 'Hope' and we have been asking our staff and children how can we support others in their hopes and aspirations too? Something to consider at home too.






Post 16





Class 10-Our Week

VPNs have many legitimate uses, e.g. running a VPN when on a wireless hotspot or hotel network that you don't trust, gives you additional security. Using a VPN also provides improved privacy, preventing ad networks from tracking you and working out where you live. VPNs are also often used to bypass protections, e.g. watching UK streaming TV when abroad by pretending that

Malware infections

Installing any unknown application is fraught with danger, and the same applies to many free VPN applications. By installing suspicious software, a child may be opening themselves up to being spied on and their private details being stolen. If you use a shared device with a child, an infection can also affect you. Malware can spread, and there's then a higher risk to other devices on your network.

Safety Tips

Check parental controls

Although the risks might seem entirely different, protection from VPNs is the same for all other threats. Check the parenta control software that you're using to see if there's a filter to block VPN/Proxy traffic. If this is selected, it will prevent most known VPNs from working, along with proxy websites.

If you have parental control software that can restrict application use, make sure that you investigate any placint in that your child wants to install and block all VPNs. If sure recently enabled any applications, go back and check what they're used for and remove any VPNs that you find.

Ensure safe use

You can use a child's computer to try and view a restricted website to ensure that filtering is still in place. Also look out for computers and phones that display a different connection symbol when a VPN is connected to help monitor your child's internet usage and have open discussions with them about their online activities.
