Dear Parents/Carers,

The second week of the spring term has gone well and we have made good progress with our asymptomatic testing in school. Attendance is still very good and I would like to remind all parents of the opportunity that is available for every child to attend school through the current national lockdown. We understand however and have authorised absences for parents wishing to keep their child at home and we will be sending updated learning activities to these children at the weekend, for next week.

The children in school are continuing their usual curriculum lessons and we have benefitted from opportunities for many pupils being able to attend Cronkshaw Hall Farm, Gorse Hill Studios, Longford Park, Greater Manchester Outdoor Learning and the Children's Adventure Farm Trust this week for enrichment lessons. The pupils have been really well engaged in these activities and have enjoyed their off-site lessons.

Our Covid 19 test centre has been open daily, providing staff and pupils with the opportunity to undertake lateral flow tests in school. The system was a complex set up but should, we hope, allow us to identify potential positive test cases, which can help us reduce the spread of the coronavirus and keep pupils and staff in school. The testing process has gone very well and we must thank Mr McLoughlin and Mr Cooper for their leadership in organising such an efficient and safe programme. We certainly appreciate the consent given by many parents and would value other parents, after reading the information we sent, providing consent to test also. Please contact the School through the Admin team to discuss.



#### **Class 10 News**


Being in a bubble isn't always so bad you know. In our class, many of the pupils have been building relationships and forming
